Our faculty teach courses that address issues like forms of punishment in the U.S. and global context, how gender shapes people's experiences with crime, environmental and state crime, as well as evidence-based policing practices. Moreover, our undergraduate program provides students with a strong theoretical foundation in sociology, research methods, data collection, and analysis. These are all essential skills for a wide variety of careers including those associated with law, justice, or advocacy.
